THE CERNE ABBAS MUSIC FESTIVAL

Welcome to the First Cerne Abbas Music Festival, an event we intend to present annually. The Festival aims to present chamber music concerts of the highest standard in an atmosphere of relaxed informality. Cerne Abbas has been described as 'one of the most compelling of Dorset villages because it has inherited a town-sized history'. Many hundreds of people come to walk through its ancient streets, gaze with disbelief at its 180 foot naked giant (he's been there for nearly 2,000 years) and visit the beautifully restored church of St Mary the Virgin. An important Benedictine Abbey was founded in Cerne in 987 AD, with Aelfric as its first Abbot. It was almost totally destroyed in Henry VIII's Dissolution of the Monasteries. The Porch to the Abbot's hall is still standing with its splendid Oriel window. The villagers probably used the nave of the Abbey Church until about 1300, when the monks built them this church dedicated to St Mary the Virgin. We share in the worship of the centuries and in the enjoyment of God's gift of music, and we are grateful to The Gaudier Ensemble for coming to inaugurate our First Music Festival.

THE GAUDIER ENSEMBLE

The Gaudier Ensemble is a group of outstanding European musicians who come together to perform and record the chamber music repertoire for wind and strings, bringing with them an international outlook and style. Its members have distinguished themselves as soloists, chamber musicians and orchestral Principals notably with The Chamber Orchestra of Europe and The English Chamber Orchestra. Based in England, they gave their first concert with George Malcolm in summer 1986, as part of the Aldeburgh Mozart Festival and, for the next two years, became resident ensemble at Kettle's Yard* in the University of Cambridge, where they were able to develop their repertoire and establish their distinctive musical identity.

In June, 1989, The Gaudier Ensemble made their London debut at the Wigmore Hall, and last year their recording of Schubert's Octet was voted First Choice in the BBC's *Building a Library* feature. Since then, The Gaudier Ensemble has toured regularly in the UK, appearing with great success in the leading Concert Halls and Festivals. Immediately following their residency here in Cerne Abbas, they will appear at the City of London Festival and record the Beethoven Septet and Sextet for Two Horns and Strings for Hyperion. In 1991/92, they embark on an International career with concerts in Germany and Italy.



Marieke Blankestijn (violin) was born in Holland and first studied in Amsterdam. Whilst studying in Salzburg with Sandor Vegh, she won the International Mozart Competition. She is the leader of the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, frequently performing and recording as soloist with them. She also has an active solo and chamber music career in Holland.

Iris Juda (violin) was born in Holland and, after winning a number of important prizes there, went to study violin with Sandor Vegh in Salzburg. She is a founder member of the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, and now lives in London where she plays with many of the leading chamber ensembles.

Jane Atkins (viola) gained a place at the Yehudi Menuhin School at the age of six. She then won a scholar-ship to the Guildhall School of Music and has won many competitions leading to solo performances with The London Philharmonic, The English Chamber Orchestra and many others. Her first solo recording for Collins Classics will be issued this summer.

Roger Tapping (viola) studied at Cambridge University and in Berlin, and was a founder member of the Chamber Orchestra of Europe. He then joined various chamber groups which took him on tours of the Far East and Mexico and led to some highly acclaimed chamber music records. In 1989, he joined the Allegri Quartet and became a Professor at the Royal Academy of Music.

Christoph Marks ('cello) was born in Germany. After several years as Principal 'Cellist of the Nordeutsche Rundfunk Orchestra in Hanover, he now makes frequent appearances as soloist, conductor and chamber musician.

Stephen Williams (double bass) is Principal Bass of the English Chamber Orchestra, having previously spent three years with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. He also works with The Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields and is frequently invited to play in the major chamber works featuring Double Bass.

Richard Hosford (clarinet) was born and brought up near Milton Abbas in Dorset. He is now Principal Clarinet of The Chamber Orchestra of Europe, with whom he has recorded the Mozart and Copland Concertos and all the major works for wind ensemble. Until April, 1991, he was also Co-Principal Clarinet with the BBC Symphony Orchestra.

Robin O'Neill (bassoon) is Principal Bassoonist with the English Chamber Orchestra with whom he appears frequently as soloist, both in the UK and abroad. He is much in demand as chamber musician with many leading ensembles and this year makes a solo appearance at the Proms.

Jonathan Williams (horn) is Principal Horn of The Chamber Orchestra of Europe with whom he appears regularly as soloist and has recorded the Mozart Horn Concertos and major works for wind ensemble. He is a regular guest of ensembles and orchestras throughout Europe.

Phillip Eastop (horn) studied at the Royal Academy of Music. When he was 19, he became Principal Horn with the London Sinfonietta where he stayed for 8 years. He now freelances with all the major Ensembles and Orchestras in London and has made two albums of improvised music with Jonathan Williams.

^{*}Kettle's Yard was the home of the great collector of 20th Century Art, Jim Ede, which he gave to the University of Cambridge. Mr. Ede campaigned for the recognition of Henri Gaudier-Brzeska, the brilliant French sculptor, killed at the age of 25 in the Second World War, whose works are well represented in Kettle's Yard.
